# MESSAGE FROM THE CEO

2025 was a pivotal year. We welcomed two new leaders who will shape our future. Sneha Mantri, MD, MS, our first Chief Medical Officer, who is a practicing movement disorders specialist and will help empower our community to advocate for better care. With the appointment of our first Chief Strategy and Policy Officer, Andi Lipstein Fristedt, we formally enter the policy arena — advancing advocacy efforts that protect Parkinson’s research and access to care at the federal and state levels.

Our groundbreaking genetics study, *PD GENERation: Powered by the Parkinson’s Foundation*, continues to expand — enrolling more than 30,000 participants — providing access to genetic testing and counseling, helping people better understand their disease and personalize their care. This study also strengthens the bridge to clinical trials, accelerating discovery and bringing us closer to new treatments, and one day, a cure.

This year, we saw momentum within the Parkinson’s Virtual Biotech, our research-driven investment fund with Parkinson’s UK. Through this initiative, two new drugs are moving into clinical trials — clear evidence that early investment sparks innovation and reduces the risk of funding for future investors, while speeding up the development of new Parkinson’s therapies.

Thank you to the scientists, researchers, clinicians and supporters like you who make progress possible and drive impactful work forward. Together, we move closer to a future without Parkinson’s. Thank you for all you helped us achieve in 2025.

# RESEARCH

**PD GENERation: Powered by the Parkinson's Foundation** is transforming how the world understands Parkinson's disease (PD). In just five years, this groundbreaking genetics initiative has empowered 30,000 people to understand their genetic tie to Parkinson's, while fueling global Parkinson's research with one of the most diverse genetic datasets in the field.

PD GENERation continues to expand, furthering its goal that anyone diagnosed with PD — anywhere in the world — can receive genetic testing and counseling. In 2025, the study **launched new sites** across Latin America, where access to genetic testing and counseling is limited. Participants from these locations add critical data that helps scientists reveal the genetic architecture of PD, **accelerating the development of new therapies and speeding up the clinical trial process.**

In a year when federal funding for disease research sharply declined, we significantly increased our investment in Parkinson's research — awarding more than **\$4.3 million across 44 research grants.** We are proud to fund scientists leading innovative studies — driving the development of new therapies, treatments, and ultimately a cure for the 10 million people worldwide living with this disease. Our grantees are actively researching ways to detect Parkinson's earlier, addressing cognitive decline sooner, leveraging AI, optimizing exercise to slow progression, and more.

Our commitment to accelerate new treatments remains strong through the **Parkinson's Virtual Biotech**, a research-driven investment fund we support alongside Parkinson's UK. This initiative funds nearly a dozen projects, fueling innovation by supporting early-stage therapies and reducing risk for future investors. In 2025, two projects reached major milestones:

- Project ASPro-PD is the **first project to reach a phase 3 trial**, testing whether ambroxol (a common cough medicine ingredient) can slow Parkinson's progression in those with genetic PD. This trial is the closest to delivering a new treatment.
- A new drug from NRG Therapeutics designed to repair the mitochondria that power brain cells, will soon advance to clinical trials for PD.

Together, these achievements show how our diverse approach is evolving into real possibilities aimed to improve quality of life for people with Parkinson's.




Receiving this award is both an honor and a profound responsibility. Parkinson's disease affected my grandfather before his passing, and this personal experience inspired my commitment to understanding the disease at a fundamental scientific level. The primary research goal of my laboratory is to elucidate core principles of synaptic physiology and the roles of key Parkinson's-associated proteins, laying the groundwork for future drug and gene therapy development.



At the Parkinson’s Foundation, we are **raising the standard of care** to improve health and quality of life for people living with Parkinson’s. Our programs and resources support every stage of the care journey and empower people to find and advocate for the best care possible. Here’s how we helped optimize care in 2025 through the **Parkinson’s Foundation care continuum**.

## THE PARKINSON’S FOUNDATION CARE CONTINUUM



**1 Community-Based Care:** Most people begin their care journey with a general neurologist or primary care physician. We are reaching more neurologists and providers to support earlier, more accurate diagnosis and connect them to Parkinson’s-specific resources. Our new Optimizing Parkinson’s Care Initiative empowers people with PD to make the most of their visits through preparation and self-advocacy.

- 2 **Specialized Care:** Movement disorders specialists, neurologists with additional training, provide expert guidance. Through our Global Care Network, we designate medical centers that deliver **consistent and comprehensive care**. These 62 centers treat this complicated disease through a specialized team-based approach.
- 3 **In-Patient Care:** Each year, more than 300,000 people with Parkinson's receive hospital care in the U.S. We lead a nationwide effort to improve care through our Hospital Care Initiative, which works to **prevent avoidable harm and promote more reliable care** for people with Parkinson's. We have partnered with more than 200 clinicians and hospital leaders and provide our Hospital Safety Guide at no cost.
- 4 **Long-Term Care:** In advanced Parkinson's, added support may be needed to ensure safety and comfort. Our Community Partners in Parkinson's Care program trains senior living and home care staff to provide optimal support to people living with Parkinson's in 93 member sites across 25 states.
- 5 **Support Along the Way:** Throughout the Parkinson's journey, supplemental services and complementary therapies are critical to managing symptoms and maintaining independence. We provide ongoing education to healthcare professionals, alongside access to free courses for the PD community through our Learning Lab.

# EDUCATION

Education and access to reliable resources **empower people with Parkinson's**, their families and care teams **to make informed decisions with confidence**. That's why we continually publish new information and tools that support people at every stage of Parkinson's to strengthen connections across the PD community.

**PD Health @ Home** celebrated five years of accessible, year-round education programming. This virtual platform continues to bring health, wellness and education programs to people's homes — reaching more than **377,400 participants** through online events, including webinars tailored to veterans with PD and those newly diagnosed.

To better listen and learn from the community, we also launched our first **State of the Community Survey**, asking people with Parkinson's and care partners what matters most to them. Top concerns include:

- addressing symptoms
- planning for the future
- managing medications

These insights will guide the development of future resources and events to better meet the community needs.

We continue to grow our **Spanish-language resources** to better support people around the world. In 2025, **1.3 million people** visited our Spanish webpages — our most ever — with top traffic from the U.S., Spain, Argentina and Mexico. We now offer **more than 90 Spanish pages** on [Parkinson.org/Espanol](https://Parkinson.org/Espanol). Also in 2025, we trained **399 advocates** through our Promotores de Salud program, equipping community health workers with the tools they need to educate and empower Spanish-speaking families affected by Parkinson's.

# BY THE NUMBERS

In 2025, we welcomed **239 new Ambassadors** who together reported **4,286 hours of community service**, and helped raise awareness and connect more people to local support. Our **Community Grants** supported local, life-changing Parkinson's programs across the U.S. from dancing, early-onset support groups and boxing classes, these programs encourage community connection while improving physical and mental well-being for participants. This year, we funded **92 community grants throughout 38 states**.

We aim to reach the **one million people** in the U.S. living with Parkinson's and engage them through our virtual tools, publications and educational platforms, achieving **24,282 podcast downloads** and **340,000 printed publications distributed**. Each of these touchpoints helps us advance our mission to make life better for people with Parkinson's — through education, empowerment and connection.





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# HOPE IN ACTION: DONORS MAKING A DIFFERENCE



## Murphy Family Gives Back Through Business

For more than 20 years, Mike Murphy has stood by his father, Robert, through his battle with Parkinson's disease (PD). He supported him from diagnosis, to managing Osgoode Marley — the leather goods company Robert started and Mike now runs — and even moved his family into Robert's home, where they cared for him for more than a decade.

Every year, Mike makes a donation to the Parkinson's Foundation through the business his dad started in his honor and to give back to the PD community.

*"My father found the Parkinson's Foundation years ago and we decided to do what we could, to do something that was close to our family," Mike said.*

As challenging as the journey has been, Mike said the extra time spent with his dad over the years has been a gift to him and his family. "I can't stress enough how important it is to have your own support system," Mike said. "God bless my wife for being on this road with me, I couldn't have done it without her. You need outlets and take care of your own mental wellbeing before you can be there for others."

He is proud to support the Parkinson's Foundation and others who are facing Parkinson's, and to raise awareness through his company. "Supporting an organization like the Parkinson's Foundation is easy," he said. "Use the resources they provide. They are doing the true, hard work."



## The Fields Family Propels Parkinson's Research

The Fields family is fighting Parkinson's disease together. Together, they support Barbara, who was diagnosed 10 years ago. As a family, they support research for a cure.

*"We decided to do some philanthropy as a family and it has been a fun thing to do. Somebody once told me you should give money to things that either make you mad or sad, and Parkinson's ticks both of those boxes," said Bryan, Barbara's husband.*

Bryan and Barbara, along with their son Michael and his wife Francie, and their son Evan and his wife Leyla, decided to make a donation to the Parkinson's Foundation. Together, they support a postdoctoral research grantee.

"After we spoke to the Foundation and did some research, we learned that these grants are important in setting career paths for researchers," Bryan said. "Our gift allows one more young researcher to receive a Parkinson's Foundation grant and establish a career in Parkinson's research. We felt like our gift could really make a difference, that we were doing something that mattered."

They hope their support of young researchers will lead to a better understanding of what causes Parkinson's and how it can be prevented or cured. "There is still confusion about the fundamentals of Parkinson's," said Evan. "Figuring that out can help the 10 million people living with Parkinson's now, as well as all of the people who will be diagnosed in the future."



## John and Jill Find Community and Hope Through the Parkinson's Foundation

"The Parkinson's Foundation has opened up a new world for John and changed his vision of what it is to have Parkinson's and what it means to be part of a community," said Jill, John Nicholson's wife.

After utilizing several Foundation resources to better understand PD and how to live well with it, Jill found Parkinson's Revolution, the Foundation's indoor cycling fundraiser. Both Jill and John felt it was a great way to get more involved and connect with more people in the Parkinson's community.

"I've ridden a bike for years, indoors and outdoors, and used to do a lot of fundraising rides for different causes," said John. "I always enjoyed the rides, but now I finally had a chance to do one for me. It was a natural fit to be able

to ride the bike and raise money for Parkinson's at the same time."

Jill immediately joined and began fundraising as well, sharing their story on social media and asking family and friends for support. She was moved by the response. Together, they completed the ride and became the top fundraisers for Parkinson's Revolution 2025, generously matching the amount they raised.

*"It is stunning that every six minutes someone is diagnosed with Parkinson's," said Jill. "It's vital to get the word out and explain the urgency of Parkinson's. The Parkinson's Foundation is a great steward of the funds they receive. Every dollar spent goes to great use and will benefit quality of life for people with Parkinson's and hopefully lead to a cure."*




